Points to Ponder: Luke 1: 26-38

The question of Mary in today's Gospel reading "How can this come about?" is a very human one. It is the kind of question that is asked by others in the Gospels. When Jesus was with His disciples in the wilderness in the presence of a hungry crowd, they asked Him, "How can one feed these people with bread here in the desert?" When we stand before a situation which seems beyond our resources to deal with, we all find ourselves asking the same kind of question, "How can this be?" "How will I get through this?" The angel Gabriel's answer to this question of Mary invited her to trust not in herself but in God. "The Holy Spirit will come upon you and the power of the Most Hig will overshadow you." A lot was being asked of Mary and it would make great demands on her, but she was not being asked to take on this task of being mother to God's Son on the basis of her own resources alone. With this reassurance, she surrendered to the demanding task that God was giving her, "Let what you have said be done to me." Mary has often been described as a model disciple. In today's Gospel reading, she models a faith that trusts in God's power, stands ready to do what God asks. The question, "How can this be?" can inhibit us, hold us back, but, as in the case of Mary, it can also open us up to the working of the Holy Spirit within us and through us. Fr Martin Hogan.
